What is a Business Breakfast?

We invite people from different industries to come and share with our students their career pathways. How did they become what they are today? What does their job involve? What qualifications/skills do you need? What advice would they give to students? And the question that is always asked...what do they earn?

Who can attend and where can you find out more?

Some talks are targeted at specific year groups, but all year groups will have the opportunity to attend several talks. The Breakfasts are advertised on Teams and the screens around the school, students can book their place by messaging Ms, Thomas.

What has been going on so far?

So far this term, we have had talks from a Police Inspector explaining digital forensics, an ex-pupil who is now a Doctor an Occupational Therapist who

brought many things to try, a Pharmacist who is also a lecturer at Keele University, Apprentices from BBC Radio Stoke, a Solicitor who came to offer work experience opportunities and to talk about degree apprenticeships, a Marketing firm and a Broadcasting journalist from Signal 1 Radio.

Year 7 Mock Interview Day

On Wednesday 13th December, Y7 took part in our first ever Mock Interview Day. Y12 students supported the event by acting as the employer, with a set of preprepared interview questions to use with Y7.

Y7 have spent time researching their personality type using Unifrog and the Buzz quiz. They researched the link between personality and career choice and have an understanding of why it is important to choose a career pathway which aligns to interests, personality and individual skills.

Students used Unifrog to research the careers profiles and prepared their responses to the five interview questions.



On Mock Interview Day, Y7 students demonstrated confidence and excellent communication skills. They were able to articulate their responses in a very professional manner. Well done Y7! You're hired! The event was a huge success and the support from our wonderful Y12 students was invaluable. They showed excellent leadership skills, and patiently encouraged Y7 to shine. Meet Clive Shaw our independent careers advisor

How did you become a Careers Advisor?

I went to a careers advisor when I was at university and it was like a spark, I knew this was something I was interested in. I then worked for Stoke Council in the careers service for many years, and when I was made redundant I decided to become a self-employed consultant. I had already been working with St. Joseph's in my previous role and enjoyed working with such motivated students, so was keen to continue.

What is your role as a Careers Advisor at St. Joseph's?

My role is to give impartial advice to students and to help them focus on their future. In preparation for their interview, students attend a pre-appointment where they research their potential next steps and prepare questions for me to help them. During our interview we look at options open to them, what is the best choice for them, open days they could attend, and interview techniques. Following the appointment they give feedback.

What are the most popular careers?

The labour market is constantly changing, and with advances in technology the opportunities and types of career change with the market. It is important that you have a spark for a career, an unbreaking passion for something that does not fade.

What is the best advice you could give someone?

Find out about yourself, your likes and dislikes and what you are good at! Research the career you are interested in think about what would be the best fit for you, make a list and tick off the most interesting job ideas; attend open days at colleges and universities. It is never too early to start preparing. Mistakes are part of the process and you learn from them; remember you can always change direction!

Year 10 and Year 12 Work Experience Launch

On Wednesday 22nd November, Y10 took part in our work experience assembly hosted by MPloy, who provide services to assist our work placements. The students were given guidance on how to approach employers, what criteria to use when planning their placement, what activities they could be involved in, and the benefits of work experience for their futures.

The students now have time to go away and research their options, contact employers and find their work placements.

Y12 have been set a similar task to research and contact employers for their work placements. Over recent weeks we have had a number of talks from employers offering apprenticeships. In particular a local Law firm came in to present information about degree apprenticeships and offer the possibility of work experience placements.



Year 12 Biomed Club

As part of the extracurricular offering at St. Joseph's, more than 40 Y12 students have signed up for the Biomed Club this On 5th October, Mrs Gilding and Mrs Cumbo attended the academic year.

Alongside sharing on-line lectures and articles to support students with their personal development, we have also welcomed some external speakers.

In October, Mitch Licata, a St. Joseph's College Alumni and previous Head Boy, came to share his journey from applying to medicine to recently qualifying. Mitch shared his engaging, honest and candid views about his experiences including his current placement at a psychiatric unit, and was Consultant – Andrew Stephens - to shape our offering. more than happy to answer the many questions. In November, Dr Dent (Academic Lead for Admissions, Recruitment & Marketing and MBChB Admissions Tutor at Keele University) came in to provide advice and guide on medicine as a career and to offer incredible useful advice on the application process. Students submitted a range of thought provoking and well considered questions in advance staff on in September - see further information on which Dr Dent answered in great depth.

The group have also had the opportunity to review and collectively debate the issues raised in a British Medical Journal regarding a large-scale malaria vaccine study and this half term, will be reviewing the ethical considerations & wider issues raised in the Charlie Gard case from 2017.

Having commenced a Level 6 qualification in Careers Leadership at the University of Derby in September 2022, we are pleased to share that

both Mrs Gilding and Mrs Cumbo passed with flying colours in June 2023 and are now fully qualified Careers Leaders!

The course involved both lectures and personal study on topics ranging from Careers theory and Labour Market Information Provision to Legislative and Good Practice Requirements. It was quite an intense period of study but both are thrilled to have completed the course and are already putting into place what they learnt!

We are grateful to the Careers Hub for their funding and support of the course which also facilated attendance at the National Careers Leaders Conference at Derby University in summer 2023.



The Music department were very excited to hold our first careers evening at the end of November, for students from Y7-13 and their families. The aim of the evening was to give students an opportunity to learn about the variety of careers they could aspire to, should they choose to study Music or Performing Arts at GCSE or A'Level. It was also a chance for students to learn more about careers in the music industry and discover some occupations that they may not have known about or considered before.

We were incredibly fortunate to have four fabulous speakers to share their career journeys and speak to us about how studying music has impacted them in their professions. It was wonderful to hear from Sam - a partner in a law firm, Stephen - a headteacher, Hassan - a representative from Keele Medical School and Matt, a sound engineer: about how studying music can facilitate a career in four completely different areas and how it really benefitted them in so many ways. The students then had the opportunity to chat to our speakers and ask them any questions about their careers and experiences with music.

It was a very successful evening with lots of positive feedback and it was lovely to see so many positive and productive conversations happening around careers

both in and out of the creative industry. We will definitely be looking to hold the evening again next year.

In addition to the careers evening, the music department are really excited to be working on building opportunities to learn more about creative careers within the department. Amongst other things, we are building up a collection of videos and testimonials from St. Joseph's alumni and industry professionals to give students an insight into a range of careers and opportunities that studying music could open up to them. It is very exciting to see the range of information being made available to our students and we are looking forward to seeing the positive impact this will hopefully have on the students.

Next Steps Focus Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are real jobs with real employers, allowing you to work, earn a salary and gain valuable qualifications and experience.

With over 600 different apprenticeship standards covering everything from accountancy to zoo keeping, there is an apprenticeship out there for everyone. Apprenticeships offer choice, opportunity, qualifications, support and a head start into a future career.

An apprenticeship includes:

- paid employment with holiday leave
- hands-on-experience in a sector/role of interest
- at least 20% off-the-job training
- formal assessment which leads to a nationally recognised qualification

Some apprenticeship facts:

- 2.2m+ have started an apprenticeship since 2015.
- 1500+ apprenticeship roles available
- £1.5m average lifetime earnings of a higher apprentice.
- 93% of apprentices remain employed upon completion.

What is an apprenticeship?

8 key facts you need to know

An apprenticeship is a real job.

Available to individuals 16+ (with no upper age limit), apprentices are typically employed for at least 30 hours per week.

Apprentices are paid a salary.

All apprentices will earn a salary of at least the National Minimum Wage. Many employers pay more!

Apprenticeships last a minimum of 12 months Most apprenticeships take between 1 - 4 years to complete. It will depend on the level and delivery model of the apprenticeship.

Apprenticeships range from level 2 to level 7. There are apprenticeships at levels equivalent to GCSEs right up to Master's level and you can now achieve a degree through an apprenticeship.


Apprentices do not pay for their training. All apprenticeship costs are paid for by the employer and/or the government meaning that an apprentice will never have to pay for their training.

Apprentices will receive paid off-the-job learning. The equivalent of 6 hours per week of an apprentice's paid time will be spent undertaking off-the-job learning, gaining valuable skills and qualifications.

Apprentices will spend the majority of their time on-

Most of an apprentice's paid time will be spent on-the-job, working with colleagues to learn new skills and gain experience of the workplace.

New apprenticeships are advertised each week covering a wide range of job roles. You will be amazed at the variety and breadth available!
